# Kennett High School Profile

## School and Community Data

Kennett is a public high school located in the Mt. Washington Valley resort community of North Conway, New Hampshire with a year round population of over 10,000 which swells to 25,000 during peak summer and winter vacation periods. The high school draws its student population from eight communities covering over 1,000 square miles. The major industries in the valley are in the hospitality field. The area is almost entirely residential with students coming from an extremely wide socioeconomic background.

Kennett High School is accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges and by the New Hampshire Department of Education. In 2009, Kennett High School was honored as a High School of Excellence for the state of New Hampshire winning the "ED"ies Award for excellence in Education. The current enrollment in the high school is 707 students. In 2007, Kennett High School moved into a new building.

### Curriculum Information

Kennett High School has a broad range of course offerings in core content areas as well as a wide range of elective classes. Courses are available in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Spanish, French, visual and performing arts, health, and physical education. Students in all grades are expected to explore career and technical classes in the state of the art Mount Washington Valley Career and Technical Center. Course offerings include; Automotive Technology, Aviation, Teacher Education, Criminal Justice, Culinary Arts, Graphic Arts/ Multimedia, Health Science Technology, Marketing, Advanced Manufacturing Technology, Construction Trades, Business/ Accounting, Outdoor Recreation, Pre-Engineering/ Drafting, Computer Science and Robotics.

The school year consists of two semesters divided into four quarters. Classes meet mostly in a 4X4 block, although freshmen have six classes. Classes are 85 minutes or 41 minutes in length and we have a 30 minute flex/advisory block in the middle of the day. Students earn a ½ credit for quarter classes, 1 credit for semester classes, 1 credit for yearlong 41 minute classes and 2 credits for yearlong 85 minute classes. We offer a wide range of clubs, activities, and sports that are open to all students after school hours.

#### Course Levels

Courses at Kennett High School are designated as Advanced, College Prep, or General. An advanced level course is either an Advanced Placement course, a Running Start course or a course that will prepare students for Advanced Placement coursework. College prep courses require a high level of achievement, and it is recommended that students planning to attend colleges select most of their courses at the college prep level. AP, Advanced, and College Prep classes are weighted for juniors and seniors only. A general level course is a course in which additional time and support is provided for students to achieve academic standards outlined in our school mission statement. Students in grades 9-11 are expected to be enrolled in 4 classes per semester. Seniors have more flexibility.
